Slavey Words to Learn for Kids or Beginners (as taken from A Grammar of Slave by Keren Rice) (Hr-Hare, Bl-Bearlake, Sl-Slavey, Mt-Mountain)

Tone: There are two tones in Slave, high and low. High tone is indicated by an acute accent ; low tone is generally unmarked but is marked by a grave accent when it is relevant. Every vowel carries a tone phonetically. Some near minimal pairs for tone are given later. These differ phonetically primarily by the presence of a phonetic glottal stop following the high tone vowel. This glottal stop is not indicated in the orthography since it is completely predictable.

Where Bearlake, Slavey, and Mountain have high tone on verb stems, Hare has high tone on the vowel preceding the verb stem and low tone on the stem itself.

In the orthography used here, these Hare high tones are written on the stem rather than on the preceding vowel. In Hare there is a third phonetic tone, an extra-high tone. This tone results when a stem high tone is placed on a lexically high tone conjunct prefix. It is written here as over the vowel.

When two high tones are adjacent, the second is higher than the first. Here the diacritic represents a higher tone than the diacritic .

In a vowel-final stem, a low tone on a stem vowel is raised to mid tone when a high tone suffix follows and the vowels are of the same quality. Mid tone is indicated by a diacritic ^ over the vowel.

When the vowels differ in quality, the tone sequence is low high."

All the complex tone derive from sequences of vowels with different tones. Assimilation rules produce phonetic long vowels with rising or falling tones.

In Hare, words often show a different surface tone pattern than other dialects as a result of a vowel loss process.

boat was certainly very good fun, but to me there is a great excitement about this flying -- across the untamed north, covering such distances with such ridiculous ease and every now end again dropping from the skies on to one of our posts, unmistakable from a considerable distance with its white buildings, red roofs and white flag staff.


Arrived at Fort Norman at 4 p.m. Met by Camsell, the postmanager - a friendly, pleasant man of sixty-four, who has just been appointed Chief Trader on retirement. Also met Dean, a young Edmonton apprentice, rather lethargic but a pleasant manner and not untelligent. The settlement includes Anglican and Roman Catholic churches, R.C.M.Police, Northern Traders, Radio Station, a Syrian trader called Johma and a few Indian shacks. The settlement is on a high bank on a corner of land at the point where the Mackenzie is joined by the Bear River flowing westward from Great Bear Lake. Here again you see the strange sight of the clear water from the Bear keeping to the right and the (by now) muddy water from the Mackenzie to the left. Went across to the mouth of the Bear to see the Northern Transport Company's boat, the "Northern Prospector", and a barge which had struck a rock near Providence on the way down and which had had eight feet of water in her. She had our Cameron Bay freight on board and R.P. wanted to size up the damage. Talked to Captain Roberts and looked at the new "Gardner" engine, a 270 H.P. diesel. - a beautiful bit of work. He told me that for all types of diesels Canadians were now going to English manufacturers. Alongside the "Morthern Prospector" was a small boat, the "Silver Queen", which takes freight from Norman to the Rapids, half way up the Bear River.

Back to our post which is one of those rebuilt in 1928. Took

some photographs and talked to Tim Gaudet, a jolly old half-breed pensioner (I had met his brother, Fred, also a pensioner, at the sailing of the "Nascopie" in Montreal 1934.) After supper a walk with R.P. to pay some calls - to the radio station, where Sergt. Ross showed us their new Marconi equipment; to the Roman Catholic Mission for a chat with a very pleasant Canadian priest, Father Turcotte; to the police where we met Const. Kenyon and Mr. Meikle, Registrar of Mines at Cameron Bay; and then to Douglas of the Northern Traders. With the latter we also met Col. Newcombe, a Government public works man, who was in charge of constructing a new portage road at the Bear River Rapids - like a great many other government jobs, an utterly unnecessary bit of work as nobody will go by the portage as long as they can run the rapids, as they do now. On the way back to the post a long talk with Slim Vibard, who is working, in a small way, a promising little coal mine twenty-five miles up the Mackenzia It appears to be part of a big seam which you can get at by a horizontal tunnel from the bank; but it is a soft lignite coal, which gives a tremendous waste in dust. Went through the buildings - beautiful store and warehouse but very unimpressive display of merchandise. Here, as at Smith and Simpson, we made a terrific splash in the palmy days and put up twice as many buildings as are needed. A cup of tea at the post at 10.30 p.m. and an amusing talk with Camsell and Dean. Heard a good story from Camsell about Tim Gaudet (I believe that it has been told about other people, and it is certainly doubtful whether it is true.) Tim bought one of the first out-board motors which was ever seen in the district, in complete ignorance of its mechanism. When he first got it, he started off from Simpson to go down to Norman; but in starting up he broke the propell

coupling without realising what he had done. He then drifted three hundred and ten miles down stream to Norman with the engine roaring round and Tim thinking what a fine speed he was making!

MONDAY, 10th. AUGUST. Up at 7 a.m. Most of the morning in the store.

Talked to Dean about display to which little attention had been given. Also went through the accounts - this is a post which should make a decent profit both on trading and furs, but there is some fairly stiff competition on furs and we shall need a manager here who is a real trader with the adventurous spirit. Visited Tim Gaudet's house and met his Indian wife and three daughters. While in here and subsequently in walking round the Indian shacks, it struck me what miserable people these Indians are, especially compared to the Eskimos - dull-eyed, lazy, lethargic, dirty and with no apparent cheerfulness. Indeed, I imagine that there can be few native peoples who are so entirely lacking in every form of gaiety and 'joie-de-vivre'. In this district they are admittedly a poor type of Indian, but even the much finer type which we met further north had nothing of the jollity and cheerfulness of the Eskimos.

Took off after lunch about 3 p.m. when the weather had cleared somewhat. Though there was a certain amount of mist and storms about, Archie kept us well away from them and we had a perfect flight. The view below us was exactly the same as the day before. Just short of Fort Good Hope the Mackenzie cuts a narrow channel through a mile or two of limestone, forming sheer cliffs on either side about three hundred feet high which are known as the Ramparts. Arrived at Fort Good Hope about 4.30 p.m. The settlement looks very fine from the air, built on a high bank, with a



While in here and subsequently in walking round the Indian shacks, it struck me what miserable people these Indians are, especially compared to the Eskimos - dull-eyed, lazy, lethargic, dirty and with no apparent cheerfulness. Indeed, I imagine that there can be few native peoples who are so entirely lacking in every form of gaiety and 'joie-de-vivre'. In this district they are admittedly a poor type of Indian, but even the much finer type which we met further north had nothing of the jollity and cheerfulness of the Eskimos.

Took off after lunch about 3 p.m. when the weather had cleared somewhat. Though there was a certain amount of mist and storms about, Archie kept us well away from them and we had a perfect flight. The view below us was exactly the same as the day before. Just short of Fort Good Hope the Mackenzie cuts a narrow channel through a mile or two of limestone, forming sheer cliffs on either side about three hundred feet high which are known as the Ramparts. Arrived at Fort Good Hope about 4.30 p.m. The settlement looks very fine from the air, built on a high bank, with a

particularly neat appearance. It includes Roman Catholic Mission. R.C.M.Police. Indian Agent, Northern Traders and ourselves. Our post is the fourth of those rebuilt in 1928 but fires have dstroyed two of the buildings during the last eight years. The last fire was at the end of 1935 and the present postmanager was living with a bare minimum of furniture, all borrowed. Stevens, the manager, had just arrived back from furlough (I met him in London in November, 1935). He is a nice chap and though he hasn't a particularly impressive manner. he appeared to have very definite ideas as to running the trade. He had had an attack of pleurisy at the end of his furlough and was still feeling a little weak. Into the store, where a bunch of local Indians had gathered to talk to R.P. and make certain complaints, particularly as to the high prices of rifles, nets and tents. R.P. looked through the prices with Stevens and found that in fact the previous manager had charged a great deal too much. Through an interpreter he told the Indians that he was very glad that they had told him their troubles and that he was taking steps to put things right at once. Then I took them outside and, amidst a good deal of laughing and chattering, took movies and stills of them. Finally R.P. told me to give them some tobacco, explaining that I had come out from the "Big Chief in London" and that this was to mark the occasion - an announcement and presentation which caused still more gaiety. Went round the buildings, and then with R.P. and Stevens to supper with Dr. Head, the Indian Agent, his wife and seventeen-year old daughter. A good dinner and interesting talk from the Doctor, who has sound ideas about the Indians and is one of the few Indian Agents who is trying to show some discretion and judgment in the

distribution of relief. He also had no illusions as to the effects of the mission schools. After supper, down to see Danes of the Northern Traders (father of our interpreter at Wrigley), a jolly, good looking chap. Then to the Roman Catholic Mission where the Father showed us round the church - in its way, the most remarkable sight of the North. It was built in 1889 by the three Fathers resident at that time. One made a very elaborate carved altar and reredos, and another did some amazing painting on the altar and altar rails, a series of paintings on the walls and three pictures. The finish and details were extraordinary. They had all been done with home-made paints, and, quite spart from the excellence of the drawings, the colours were as vivid and fresh as in any good oil painting. One of the larger pictures at the side of the alter reminded me strongly, both in design and colour, of an Italian Primitive. It is altogether a most wonderful achieve-ment - wonderful for anywhere but almost unbelievable in the far north.

Back to the store for a talk about the accounts - this is a very lucrative post and should be even more so when merchandise prices are brought more into line. Then a cup of tea and stretched our sleeping bags on the floor on some blankets for a perfect night. Incidentally, at this post I was further north than ever before, being actually about one hundred and fifty miles further north than Lake Harbour and about twenty five miles outside the Arctic Circle.

TUESDAY, 11th. AUGUST. Up at 6.15 a.m. to another perfect morning and a walk through the settlement. Took off at 8 a.m. and went straight up to 4,600' to avoid some low lying clouds - absolutely perfect, calm flight. Arrived at Arctic Red River at 9.35




